## Cholesterol and Heart Disease

I'm no scientist, but I do recognize that one segment of self-development involves the physical dimension. There

are so many aspects of our physical side, or, if you prefer, our health side, that it is difficult to regularly give each of them the attention they deserve. Just as we have to try to maintain our cars with regular oil changes, tire rotations, or tune ups, our physical selves demand that we pay attention to things like:

- Sleep
- Nutrition
- Diet
- Flexibility
- Strength
- Cardio-vascular
- Regular check-ups with a competent physician
- Etc

According to the CDC, the leading cause of death among Americans is Heart Disease. Even people who are not overweight can suffer from this killer.

Many of you who are over the age of 40 may be getting cholesterol checks and may even be taking medication to get your cholesterol and triglycerides under control. That's smart, but it's woefully insufficient. You

need to measure something in addition to cholesterol in order to detect potential threats to your health.

Here's a helpful analogy to make my point: imagine that your arteries are the freeway system in Southern California (or anywhere else.) That freeway system is loaded with cars. As far as traffic jams go (i.e., clogged arteries) does it matter at all how many passengers are in those cars?

No, of course not. Whether all the cars have only one occupant inside -- the driver -- or whether all the cars have 4 occupants inside, the result is the same: clogged freeways.

The typical cholesterol test measures the occupants of those cars -- and they don't really matter as much, frankly. Those same tests fail to measure the number of cars on the road, and that is what counts.

And while many physicians do not really understand what I just said, I do know of a first-rate cardiologist based out of Southern California that conducts precisely the right kind of test (Advanced Lipoprotein testing) that measures the cars. His name is Dr. Michael Richman. I swear by him. If you are over 40, you should pay him a visit if you are in Southern California, and even if you are not, you would do well to see if he can work with you from a distance. Chances are he can.

# The Elephant in the Room Leftism in the College Classroom

I am an adjunct professor at two institutions of higher learning. It's a fun gig but one that only occupies a small segment of my professional work.

I am well aware that, as a conservative, I am a minority in the college teaching world. Most all of my colleagues are liberals who are clearly Left of center. They see the world through that particular prism, and they live in a bubble, as they are mostly unfamiliar with conservative ideas and certainly are not used to debating conservatives. Almost none of them have even a single friend in their life who could be called a conservative.

And what I am saying is true generally of almost all colleges and universities, as the Left has taken over these institutions. Dennis Prager, a highly intelligent thought-leader and ethicist, believes that today's American University is actually a Leftist Seminary whose goal is not to teach but to produce committed Leftists. Sometimes I think Prager's negative views of the university go a bit too far.

That is, until I read stories like the one I am about to share with you.

It appears that on August 29th, the first day of class at Michigan State University, an English Professor by the name of William Penn decided to really let loose with his Leftist dogmatism and just sort of let it all hang out. Remember, he is not a PolySci professor. His academic discipline is English, and he had about 400 students in his lecture hall that first day. Here are some of the things Professor Penn offered in his effort to teach his students English (along with some brief parenthetical responses

#### from me):

 He made it known that he was a liberal Democrat, though he facetiously claimed he was actually a conservative. (Fine, but why that would be important knowledge for the students to have in a Creative Writing class is a mystery.)



- He opined that Republicans have raped this country. (Incendiary and foolish rhetoric.)
- He declared that Republicans are dead (or dying) white people. (Are there no white Democrats? Are there no non-white Republicans?)
- He claimed Republicans do not want to pay taxes.
   (Totally misleading statement.)

- He claimed that Republicans do not want to pay for the students' tuition. (He is correct. - He suggested that Republicans are (A) racist and (B)

  the students had every right to disagree with him,
  but doing so could impact their grade in the class.
  (If this is true, this is, in my considered judgment,
  the single most egregious thing he said. If true, he
  should be terminated as an instructor, for he is
  essentially urging his students not to think critically
  or carefully, but to just swallow the Leftist Kool-aid or
  risk getting a lower grade. If true, he is the
  antithesis of what an educator should be.)

Conservatives can only shake their head and say, "But of course."

Democrats on the other hand should have a very visceral reaction. This diatribe should enrage every committed member of the Democratic Party and the professor should be ostracized by them - not by Republicans - for expressing himself in this manner.

But it won't happen. Far too many on the Left see Professor Penn as progressive, courageous, bold, and genuine.
