The Elephant In The Room One Last Time: The Left and Brendan Eich

The Talmud, The Book of Mormon, and Our Modern Age

Although I am not Jewish, I am often riveted by stories I hear told by Jewish Rabbis, many of which come from a body of sacred literature unique to the Jewish tradition known as the Talmud. The stories found therein are universal, and have great application in our time.



Likewise, a volume of holy writ in the Latter-day Saint tradition - The Book of Mormon: Another Testament of Jesus Christ - contains equally compelling stories with engaging moral insights that I find particularly riveting.

One story found in the Book of Mormon concerns the death of an elderly but good man named Gideon, who is killed at the hands of a younger man who was described as being both large in stature and strong. This man is known by the name of Nehor. Nehor was not an atheist. He was a believer in God and the leader of a religious sect that bore his name (the order of Nehor.) His particular sect maintained that it was OK for preachers to seek popularity, and to be supported financially by the people. In Nehor's religion, there was no such place as hell, and all would go to heaven. He also believed in amassing great wealth and living large, dressing for success, and the like. And because he was a persuasive individual who preached a message of salvation for all and no personal responsibility to actually do good, he found many people all too willing to follow him.

But when young Nehor encountered the aged Gideon, the charade was up. Gideon didn't put up with his nonsense, a debate ensued, Nehor ended up looking foolish, and as a result, Nehor drew his sword and murdered Gideon. If you can't beat him in debate, just kill him with the sword. (Nehor was tried for his crime and was executed.)

I always wondered what it might be like to encounter a Nehor-like figure.

And I'm pretty certain I found out first hand what it would be like.

While at the local gym lifting weights just a few days ago, I encountered a fairly large fellow who had a lot of girth and resembled a power lifter. I ignored him at that point and continued with my workout until finished. Then I decided to attempt to build a bridge of understanding with him. I persuaded him to accompany me to a vacated aerobics room to talk. However, a monologue ensued, which became a one-way shouting match. He simply couldn't be reasoned with.

Fortunately for me, Mr. Nehor made no attempt on my life. But he did attempt to humiliate me, though I think he only succeeded in embarrassing himself. In fact, I'm pretty sure his outlandish and incendiary behavior resulted in his membership in that club being revoked.

Bullies will always be among us, but it is important that they not be given an uncontested slam-dunk as they do their thing, usually at the expense of others. Bullies need to be put in their place, and I enjoyed a measure of satisfaction in standing up to him.
