Many of my readers (and students) presume I'm a staunch Republican.

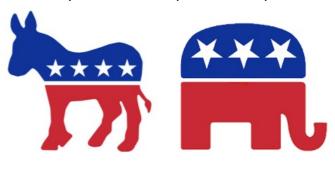
I am not.
