Self-Development

Distant Mentors

Being mentored is a great undertaking because you are entrusting yourself to someone with more experience than you, and that person is likely going to challenge you to change in ways that may not be comfortable. Most mentors notice flaws in your current performance, and they point out those flaws in an effort to get you to move in the right direction. Other times, a mentor might notice a skill or attribute you possess, and they try to help you sharpen that skill, raising a strength to an even greater level of performance. This is also a very good approach.

And while most of the mentoring relationships you will experience involve direct contact with a mentor, usually in a face-to-face encounter, but sometimes through other mediums (i.e., telephone, written correspondence, etc.) mentoring can be had in other ways.

For example, you can be mentored -- albeit at a distance -- from just about anybody, living or dead, who has left a body of accessible work that captures their

views. The raw example of a Churchill or a Gandhi, a Ronald Reagan or a Mother Teresa, can serve to shape and inform your views, actions, and undertakings. Read their writings, and read biographies of such luminaries and you will be well on your way to placing yourself in a position of being able to emulate their courage, their virtue, their leadership, their selflessness, or what have you.



Other opportunities to be mentored indirectly come

from the many thought-leaders out there who have something to say. Here are some examples from my own life:

- Almost everything I know about writing persuasive proposals for consulting engagements and the like comes from **Alan Weiss**. He wrote a fairly trim book on proposal writing, made even trimmer by the fact that every other page was left blank (for note-taking.) So while the content of that book covered a fairly small number of actual printed pages, the content was so brilliantly written, so clear, so spot-on, that I quickly realized the \$150 or so that I spent on that thin volume was worth every penny, as Alan would have likely charged me -- justifiably -- several thousand dollars for a face-to-face tutorial on the same content. I have utilized his "mentoring" almost as is, making only a few modest modifications.
- Almost everything I know about time management and life planning comes
 to me from the late **Stephen R. Covey**, my first boss out of college. Covey
 opened my eyes to the notions of importance and urgency (and their
 opposites) and from his personal teachings as well as his writings, I have
 obtained a systemic process for mapping out how and where I will spend my
 energies each week.
- While I have never met **Victor Davis Hanson**, I have learned an inordinate amount about the intellect, and how to arrange one's thoughts in a cogent, compelling manner. Hanson is a masterful writer, thinker, and teacher. While he can be a bit cerebral in his demeanor, and he's clearly soft-spoken and not

given to boorish outbursts, the man expresses himself with a learned command of facts, sources, history, and logic. I not only learn important facts from him, but I learn how to express myself in compelling ways.

As the year is winding down, I suggest you consider where you wish to grow in the near future. Find out the names of the thought-leaders who excel in your field of interest. Listen to them. Watch them. Read them. Understand their bias and where they are coming from. Implement what you learn from them.

You can be mentored by the truly great lights of the age or of the past if you make the decision to bring that about. There is nothing stopping you.

Now get out there and make it happen!
