# Strategy

"Strategy without tactics is the slowest route to victory.

Tactics without strategy is the noise before defeat."

Sun Tzu

Most business practitioners enjoy tossing around the word *strategy* in their high-level conversations. Unfortunately, far too many talkative business people have, at best, a fuzzy understanding of what strategy actually is. So let me cut to the chase: Where you are today is *Point A*. Where you wish to go next is *Point B*. Strategy is the bridge in between those two points. Strategy is how you will get from Point A to Point B. Simple enough?

There is a distinction between what has been referred to as a *Deliberate Strategy* (which is what you started out with) and an *Emergent Strategy* (which is what you often end up with). The reason for this is simple: *93% of successful endeavors do not succeed with the Deliberate Strategy*. Instead, leaders came to realize that the original strategy they set out to follow was simply not workable, in spite of the best

intentions of some rather smart individuals. This is due to the complexities of life. Sitting in a conference room for 9 hours with a group of colleagues and hashing out your strategy for some new initiative is, 93% of the time, going to bring disappointment. There are simply too many unexpected variables that will blindside even the shrewdest of executives.

The successful initiatives are successful precisely because the leaders involved are both vigilant to signs of trouble,
and nimble enough to course-correct, even to the point of jettisoning their original strategy and adopting a new, emergent strategy that is appropriate for the prevailing circumstances.

One final note: there is a question all leaders and strategists should have at the forefront of their minds whenever pursuing a new strategy. That question is: *What has to happen for this to work out as planned?* 

Asking such a question forces one to forsake lazy thinking, not to mention wishful thinking. Asking this question puts one through the necessary exercise of mapping out the requisite flow of events that we all assume will take place in a perfect world. But the world is far from perfect. The world is messy. And therefore, to quote Ronald Reagan (who was quoting a Russian proverb -- "Dovorey no provorey"), we must "Trust, but verify." And the emphasis here is clearly on verify! Doing so enables us to conceive of contingencies to adopt when things do not go as planned.

Strategy is something all of us would do well to give thought to, engage in, and work through. Whatever it is you desire in life, whether it falls within the realm of money-making, health & fitness, mental acuity, relationships, spirituality, entrepreneurial ventures, team development, skill acquisition, or virtuous citizenship, sound strategy will bend the odds in your favor and put you on a path to significant accomplishment.

# **Devolving Norms**

Dournal Writing I am sitting in a Starbucks as I write this. Though not a coffee drinker myself, I do find it contains the ambiance I like for getting work done. I also engage in a fair amount of peoplewatching. And today, I am noticing the number of people, mostly younger than me, that sport a great number of tattoos. One fellow came in with tattoos covering both arms, and going up his neck, up his face, on his eyebrows, and even on his shaved head. Another fellow came in equally covered, with an interesting hair color. His relatively short hair appeared to be lilac in color. In addition, he had disfigured his earlobes, having had someone cut large holes in them, and then inserting what are referred to as gauges. Still others sported a variety of piercings -- not just ears, but noses, eyelids, lips, nipples (yes, I saw that as well), navels, and chins. At this exact moment, not including myself, there are 18 customers in Starbucks. Having just left my table and wandered through the place, ostensibly to stretch my legs, I was readily able to see that 15 of them had tattoos that were visible. It is unknown if there were additional tattoos that were concealed.

What I am describing here is not uncommon. I go to Gold's Gym quite often. Obviously, in a place like that, there is a bit more skin being exposed. It is highly unusual for me to see a person in that environment displaying no tattoos. Almost everyone there has them. Those who do not are now the new minority.

While I can't quite explain the impression, I have this growing sense that the proliferation of tattoos, gauges, and piercings (beyond the traditional practice of a

And in no way am I suggesting that if a person gets a tattoo, they are further branding themselves as a "bad" person. I once started a conversation with a young man out on an athletic field where we were both working out who had both arms completely covered in tattoos, and from that conversation, he struck me as a very interesting and enjoyable conversationalist.

Still, I am curious about the draw that tattoos have for so many today. Perhaps for some, it's a sign of them skidding towards paganism. For others, it might be a reflection of some kind of body worship rather than worshipping God, and for others, it just might be a sign of insecurity -- either because they need the attention, or because they are simply followers, jumping on whatever bandwagon happens to be trendy. But whatever the motivation, the feeling I get, and I readily acknowledge it is merely a feeling, is that too many people are not aspiring toward virtue and elevating the human species, but instead are slouching towards vice, towards the drab, towards the uninspiring.

And it worries me. I have a sense that society as a whole is degenerating rather than elevating. Appearances do matter. They may not tell the whole story. But they do tell a story.

I am uneasy about where this story may be taking our world.
