The Fragility of Credibility

In thinking about New York City's World Trade Center with its twin towers, I am reminded that plans to build it were first announced in January 1964. The towers were completed a decade later, in 1973, at a cost of over \$900 million – triple its initial cost estimates. Yet on September 11th, 2001, radicalized Muslim terrorists succeeded in destroying both buildings, with the south tower, which was hit second, collapsing in a mere 56 minutes, while the north tower, the first to be hit, took an hour and 42 minutes before it imploded.

Ten years to raise; mere minutes to raze.

Our personal credibility is much like structures such as skyscrapers, great bridges, or even priceless works of art (think Sistine Chapel). It takes a long time to establish it, but it can be torn down rather quickly.

How to build credibility, you ask? Here are some quick thoughts:



- Make promises and keep them.
- Commit to deadlines, and then exceed such commitments, delivering what you promised a littler earlier than expected.
- Don't make excuses or play the blame game; accept responsibility and own your contributions for any mishaps.
- Sound intelligent and speak intelligently; choose your words carefully; and build your vocabulary so you can express yourself with elegance.
- Be well-read, so you can contribute wise and cutting-edge concepts and information into the conversations you participate in. You need to be informed about a lot of things.
- Show integrity and decency in all of your interactions by admitting your mistakes, and by being scrupulously honest. If you are given the equivalent of "too much change" after a transaction, return the excess immediately.

How to erode credibility? Here are things to avoid:

- · Be complainer, not a solution-provider.
- Treat people badly, so that you are often being complained about.
- Be late on deadlines, and make excuses for why you are late, blaming others in the process.
- Be disorganized, thus failing to show up for meetings you should have attended, or show up for such meetings unprepared.
- Avoid planning time, that way you can come across disjointed and unorganized in thought-process.
- Be a drama-queen; stir things up. Annoy people. Be problem-oriented, not solution-oriented.
- Don't read much; that way you can stagnate and have little to contribute that is fresh, inventive, or insightful.

Remember, building credibility takes time. It doesn't happen overnight.

And losing credibility takes almost no time. It can happen in an instant.

The Supreme Court: What's At Stake?

With the recent passing of Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, the predictable happened: Leftist Democrats all went a little crazy. Why? On Becoming an Adult

My phone rang. I vaguely recognized the number, so I answered it.

The voice on the other end was of a woman in her early 30s I hadn't heard from in quite a while. A former student, and someone whom I had mentored, she had gone on to do some pretty great things last time we had talked, which had been a few years ago.



Our pattern in past conversations was to exchange pleasantries, engage in some small talk, and then get down to business with a serious conversation, usually based on a profound question she asked. This time was no different. She soon came to her question: "Professor Norwood, how does one become an adult?"

When I am asked a question due to someone's curiosity or their need for guidance, there are times where I have a ready answer because I have already thought through their question; there are other times where I may not have the answer ready, but I know enough about the variables involved that I can comb through my mind and compose a relevant answer rather quickly; and there are other times where I really have to think about it deeply, having never given much thought to the topic.

This third scenario was the one I found myself in.

How does one become an adult?

Because I am not thinking about this question in a legal sense, it's not a matter of age. I know 14-year-olds who are much closer to adulthood than some 44-year-olds. Adulthood brings with it a certain level of maturity. Beyond that, adulthood involves a measure of looking outside oneself and considering the needs of others in addition to considering one's own needs. Thinking in terms of the greater good is intertwined with being an adult. Adolescents and teenagers are generally self-absorbed, conscious only of their whims, needs, and impulses. They often start the process of becoming adults when they get married, as they now have the needs of another person to consider. They further the process of becoming adults when they have children. Over time, and through trial and error, maturity tends to set in and cause a mellowing to take place. This further leads one towards adulthood.

I well remember a model given to us by the late Stephen R. Covey, my first boss out of college. Covey talked in terms of maturity falling along the lines of a continuum, where we begin in a state of dependency, then move into a state of independency. But Covey believed the road to maturity did not end there. Because we do not live in isolation, but in an environment of interconnectedness, we move from independence to interdependence. That, Covey insisted, is the highest manifestation of maturity. I believe that dovetails nicely with the notion of adulthood.

Adulthood is no stranger to sacrifice. Thus, adults often exercise the discipline required to sacrifice certain pleasures of today so that they may better enjoy a satisfying tomorrow. Thus, they spend less than they earn, they invest some of their money for the future, and they curb their urges to acquire lavish but unnecessary perks. They invest in their children even at the expense of their own needs, and they take the long view, considering long-term consequences and not merely immediate concerns.

Being an adult, in the end, is about exercising self-control and discipline over one's passions.
