Self-Development

Gleaning Value from Others

Great ideas are all around us. New insights abound. We just have to be open to them.

I have a great friend, RB. He is well-read, articulate, and animated. He's got loads of energy and is very sharp. One time he told me about a book by Daniel Kahneman. The book is titled <u>Thinking, Fast and Slow</u>. It is a roughly 500 page triumph of brilliance! I am a better, more informed person because of it.

Here is an excerpt from it. See if it speaks to you in any way.



HOW TO WRITE A PERSUASIVE MESSAGE

Suppose you must write a message that you want the recipients to believe. Of course, your message will be true, but that is not necessarily enough for people to believe that it is true. It is entirely legitimate for you to enlist cognitive ease to work in your favor, and studies of *truth illusions* provide specific suggestions that may help you achieve this goal.

The general principle is that anything you can do to reduce cognitive strain will help, so you should first maximize legibility. Compare these two statements.

Adolf Hitler was born in 1892. Adolf Hitler was born in 1887.

Both are false (Hitler was born in 1889), but experiments have shown that the first is more likely to be believed. More advice: if your message is to be printed, use high-quality paper to maximize the contrast between characters and their background. If you use color, you are more likely to be believed if your text is printed in bright blue or red than in middling shades of green, yellow, or pale blue.

How do you know that a statement is true? If it is strongly linked by logic or association to other beliefs or preferences you hold, or comes from a source you trust and like, you will feel a sense of cognitive ease.

That is just one short snippet. But there is a lot a content in there that could prove valuable. Furthermore, the book itself is bursting at the seams with value. Here is another such excerpt:

Suppose that you need to hire a sales representative for your firm. If you are serious about hiring the best possible person for the job, this is what you should do. First, select a few traits that are prerequisites for success in this position (technical proficiency, engaging personality, reliability, and so on). Don't overdo it – six dimensions is a good number. The traits you choose should be as independent as possible from each other, and you should feel that you can assess them reliably by asking a few factual questions. Next, make a list of those questions for each trait and think about how you will score it, say on a 1-5 scale. You should have an idea of what you will call "very weak" or "very strong."

These preparations should take you half an hour or so, a small investment that can make a significant difference in the quality of the people you hire. To avoid halo effects, you must collect the information on one trait at a time, scoring each before you move on to the next one. Do not skip around. To evaluate each candidate, add up the six scores. . . Firmly resolve that you will hire the candidate whose final score is the highest, even if there is another one whom you like better. A vast amount of research offers a promise: you are much more likely to find the best candidate if you use this procedure than if you do what people normally do in such situations, which is to go into the interview unprepared and to make choices by an overall intuitive judgment such as "I looked into his eyes and liked what I saw."

So now I've got a second wonderful gem from a great mind that can be of much value to me in my work. And I owe a great deal of debt to my friend, RB, for alerting me to Daniel Kahneman's writings.

What about you?

What great books have impacted your life? Can you share them with others, or at least, recommend them?

And what about the bright people in your life? Can you ask them to recommend a great book to you that has impacted them? If so, add those books to your reading list. Read

them, learn from them, and implement their ideas. Doing so will put you on a permanent path of growth, development, and accomplishment.

The Elephant in the Room Where Things Stand At The Moment

The month of September was instructive in that it displayed a panoply of cultural and political rot sweeping across the fruited plains. Let's review the pathological spectacle that was September.

Media Bias and Fake News



- MSNBC's Joy Reid
 made the claim that BLM doesn't riot, then she turned around and <u>blamed the</u>
 <u>rioting</u> on Donald Trump.
- CNN's Jim Sciutto made the claim that President Trump never told Vladimir Putin to refrain from meddling in our elections. Yet video tape <u>shows otherwise</u>. And there was never a correction or a retraction.
- CNN's Chris Cuomo was <u>caught on tape</u> instructing a future interviewee what to say when the interview would later take place.
- The *New York Times* <u>falsely claimed</u> that AG William Barr asked prosecutors to consider criminal charges against the mayor of Seattle.
- Media bias continued to be aired, when the media fawned all over Kamala Harris
 wearing Timberland boots, while mocking and criticizing First Lady Melania Trump
 for wearing the same boots earlier.
- And, of course, the *New York Times*, which produces a podcast called "Caliphate" featured a Canadian man who claimed to be an ISIS terrorist and who provided detailed and grizzly accounts of his murderous escapades. But, as if often the case with the *New York Times*, the entire story was a fabrication.

Radicalization of our Universities

- Nicholas Meriwether, a professor at Shawnee State University in Ohio teaches political philosophy. A male student who imagines he is actually a female approached Professor Meriwether and demanded the professor address the student by female pronounces. The professor refused, but did agree to address this student by his given name and avoid the use of pronouns altogether. This was unacceptable to the student who threatened to have the professor fired. The professor has been formally reprimanded by the administration.
- Vanderbilt University gave students a quiz with a question that suggested the U.S. Constitution was designed to <u>perpetuate white supremacy</u>.
- A **USC** business Professor, Greg Patton, was <u>relieved of his teaching duties</u>. His crime? Saying a Chinese word that sounds similar to a racial slur.

- Both faculty and students at Cornell University demanded that the university no longer admit students based on merit, but <u>based on color</u> (i.e., they want black students admitted, regardless of whether they are qualified; if they are black, then their skin color qualifies them to be admitted.) This is the new racism by the American Left.
- The **University of Chicago**'s English Department's graduate school announced that it will <u>only accept applicants</u> who are interested in working with and in Black Studies. What this has to do with an advanced degree in English remains unclear.
- Princeton University President Christopher L. Eisgruber engaged in extreme
 pandering by claiming racism is embedded in the very fabric of the university over
 which he presides, and he lamented that the university has only one black studies
 program, presumably meaning he thinks there should be multiple black studies
 programs offered.
- At **Northwestern Law School**, a Dean who spoke at a <u>diversity event</u> began by saying: "I'm Jim Speta and I am a racist!" (Kind of reminds one of an AA meeting.) Another Northwestern official at that same event, Emily Mullin, topped that by saying: "I am a racist and a guardian of white supremacy. I will work to do better."
- **Bellarmine University** President Susan Donavan, in the wake of a legal verdict following a police shooting of a woman named Breonna Taylor, cancelled classes for more than a day and essentially told all of the white students at the university that they were racists, claiming that they need to face up to their part in the systemic racism that exists within the campus community.

The "I Hate America" Crowd

- Washington DC officials are trying to figure out how to cancel some of our nation's most treasured monuments, including the Washington Monument. Why? Because DC officials think such monuments promote racism. Why else?
- Nikole Hannah-Jones, the founder of the 1619 Project at the New York Times, <u>claimed she was not</u> anti-American, and then in the next breath she said "Also, I don't think we're an exceptional nation. I think that's ludicrous for any nation to make that claim, and we certainly cannot make that claim. We're a nation founded on genocide, and chattel slavery, and classism, and gender discrimination. We're not [exceptional.]"

BLM and Leftist Racism

- Professor Jessica Krug, a George Washington professor who teaches Black History
 and believes in Black Supremacy, is a white woman who has <u>always claimed</u> to be a
 black woman. She finally confessed her sin, even though it is obvious she is a
 kook. Yet she's not alone. It turns out there are <u>quite a few</u> white women on the
 Left that loathe the color of their own skin so deeply that they have taken to falsely
