The Problem With The FAKE NEWS Media

Male and Female Differences

The differences between men and women are myriad. The similarities are also vast, but the differences are more pronounced.

How are men and women similar? For starters, both are *homo sapiens* – part of the human species. The word *homo* is Latin for *human*. The word *sapien* suggests things like *wise* or *astute*. I heard one biologist translate the term to mean *thinking man at the top*.



The similarities continue: both males and females have the ability to stand upright, to walk, run, climb, squat, sit, lie down, etc. Their hands appear to be similar in terms of structure, as do their feet, although there is usually a pronounced difference in size. Men are generally larger than women.

Men are physically stronger than women also. Men possess more raw power than do women, based on the type of muscles found in men (Type II muscles) while women, who have a greater abundance of Type I muscles, tend to recover faster than men. Men also have greater speed when running than women for this same reason.

But that doesn't mean all men are faster, larger, and stronger than all women. If one were to put me, a 63-year-old male with various physical maladies, up against, say, the most powerful female power lifters, shot putters, and MMA fighters of the day, it is a certainty I would look quite frail up against them. But an apples-to-apples comparison of putting me up against the average 63-year-old female with her own physical maladies, I'd probably out-run her, out-throw her, and out-play her in most contests. There may be occasional exceptions (example, I'm hopelessly inept at tennis) but that would be the typical outcome.

Yet when we look closer at men and women some clear distinctions come into view. First, there are certain masculine characteristics that are absent in women, just as there are certain feminine characteristics that are absent in men. There's no other way to say it: women simply look feminine; men look masculine. 997 times out of 1000, I will be able to tell, at a glance, whether a person is male or female by their facial looks alone. I won't need to know their preferred pronouns.

Women have breasts that are capable of lactation. Men do not.

Women have female genitalia; men do not.

Women have very distinctive features that make up their reproductive system, including a vagina, a uterus, fallopian tubes, and the ovaries which produce eggs. Men do not possess any of these. In fact, for the most part, the apparatus constituting the male reproductive organs (penis, scrotum, testicles, etc) are found outside of the body, whereas the female's reproductive ensemble mostly is found inside the body.

Another key difference between males and females concerns their genetic composition. Men have one X chromosome and one Y chromosome. Women, by contrast, do not have a Y chromosome. Instead, women sport two X chromosomes. (Quick biology lesson: the human genome consists of 23 pairs of chromosomes. The first 22 pairs, called autosomes, determine all of the genetic characteristics you inherit from your parents except your gender. The final, 23rd pair of chromosomes are the sex chromosomes which determine whether you are male or female. Every person will inherit one X chromosome from their mother. The other half of that 23rd pair comes from the father: if it is an X chromosome from the father, the baby will be a female, having two X chromosomes. But if the father bequeaths a Y chromosome, giving that baby an XY set for that 23rd pair of chromosomes, it will produce a baby boy.)

Women and men have other characteristics as well. These tend to fall in the realm of social science (or, what I often sardonically refer to as bad science) – which explains why I won't take the time here to describe what the "experts" claim because I don't see their work as either scientific or credible.

But I will offer it as my opinion that men and women need each other and have much to learn from each other. I believe those out there who try to paint men (or women) in a bad light and suggest that one is "better" or "superior" than the other are being silly and unenlightened. I need women in my life as much as I need men in my life. I have learned so much from wonderful women of all ages, all cultures, all educational levels, and all temperaments and personality types. And I would say the same about the men who have cross paths with me. I have enjoyed very warm relationships with all sorts of women (KT, VW, DQ, MM, DH, RB, MF, CM, LB, CS, LR, MP-H, DB, SB, DG, GC, RE, AZ) and while some of them have been very close to me, others have been on the periphery of my life, but still profoundly influential. I have learned much about feelings, strength, honesty, prudence, manners, self-control, and spirituality from the many women I have known. Likewise, the men in my life (LM, BY, MS, GH,

JM, DB, DY, CD, RB, JW, RFS, JS, DP, and JB have taught me about leadership, decency, self-sufficiency, friendship, loyalty, courage, determination, and the value of hard work. I have profited greatly from these choice women and noble men whom have enriched my life repeatedly.
